Foreword


Dear readers,

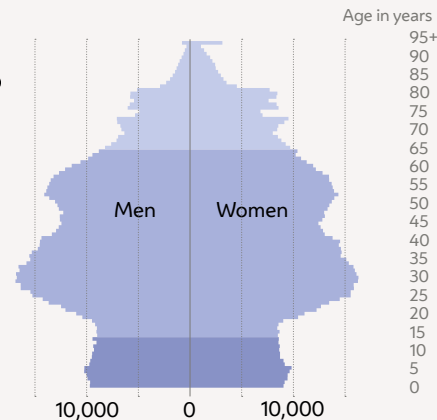

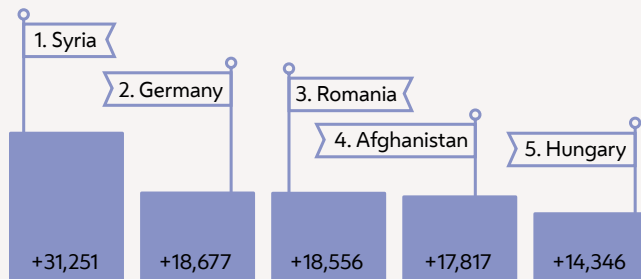

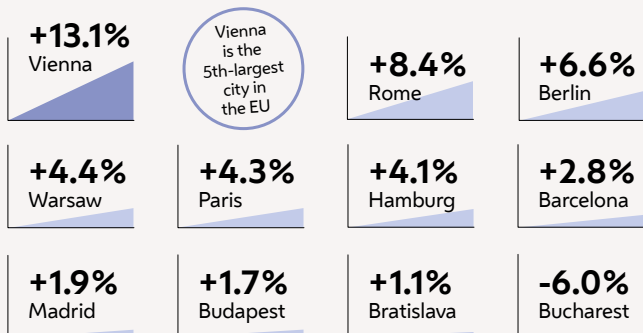

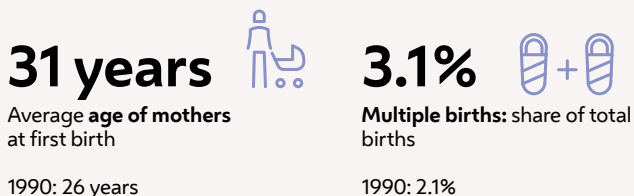

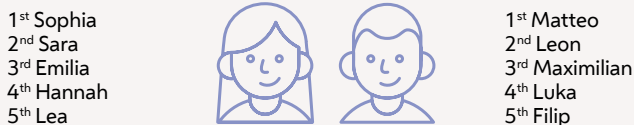

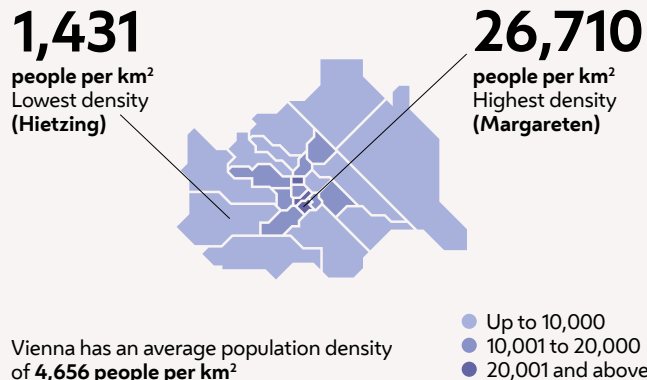

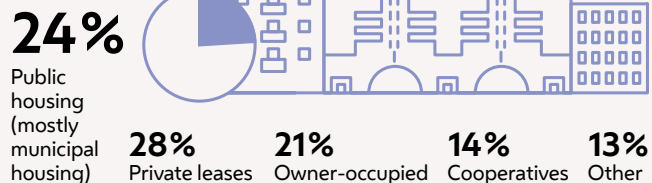

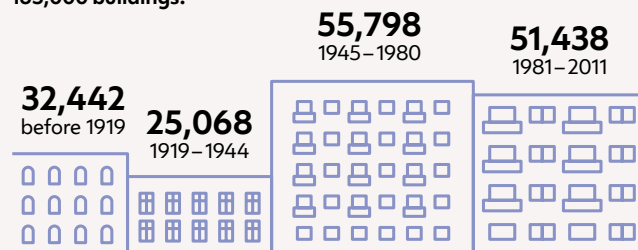

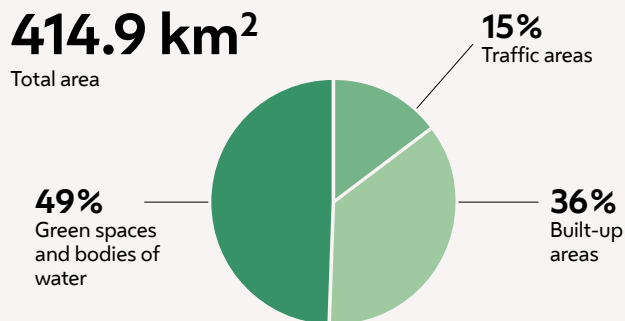

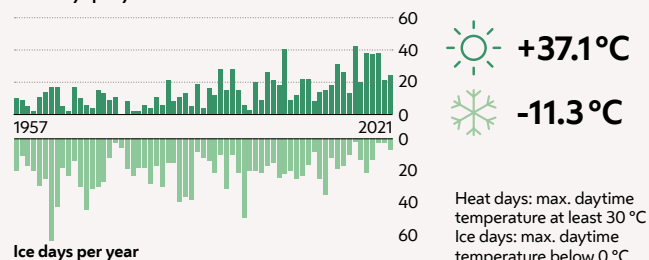

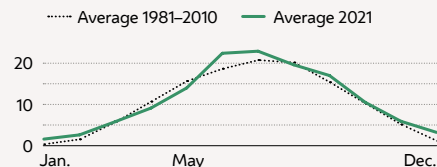

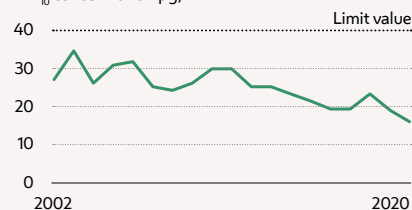

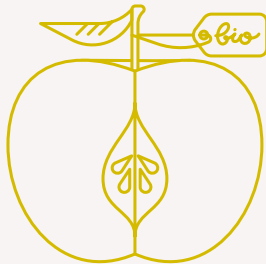

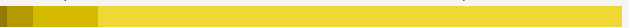

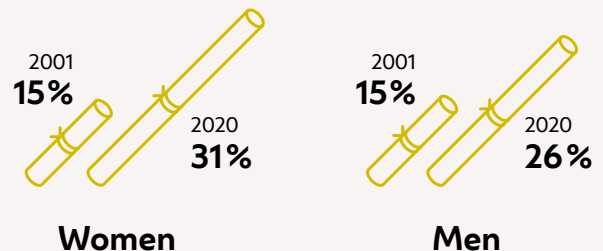

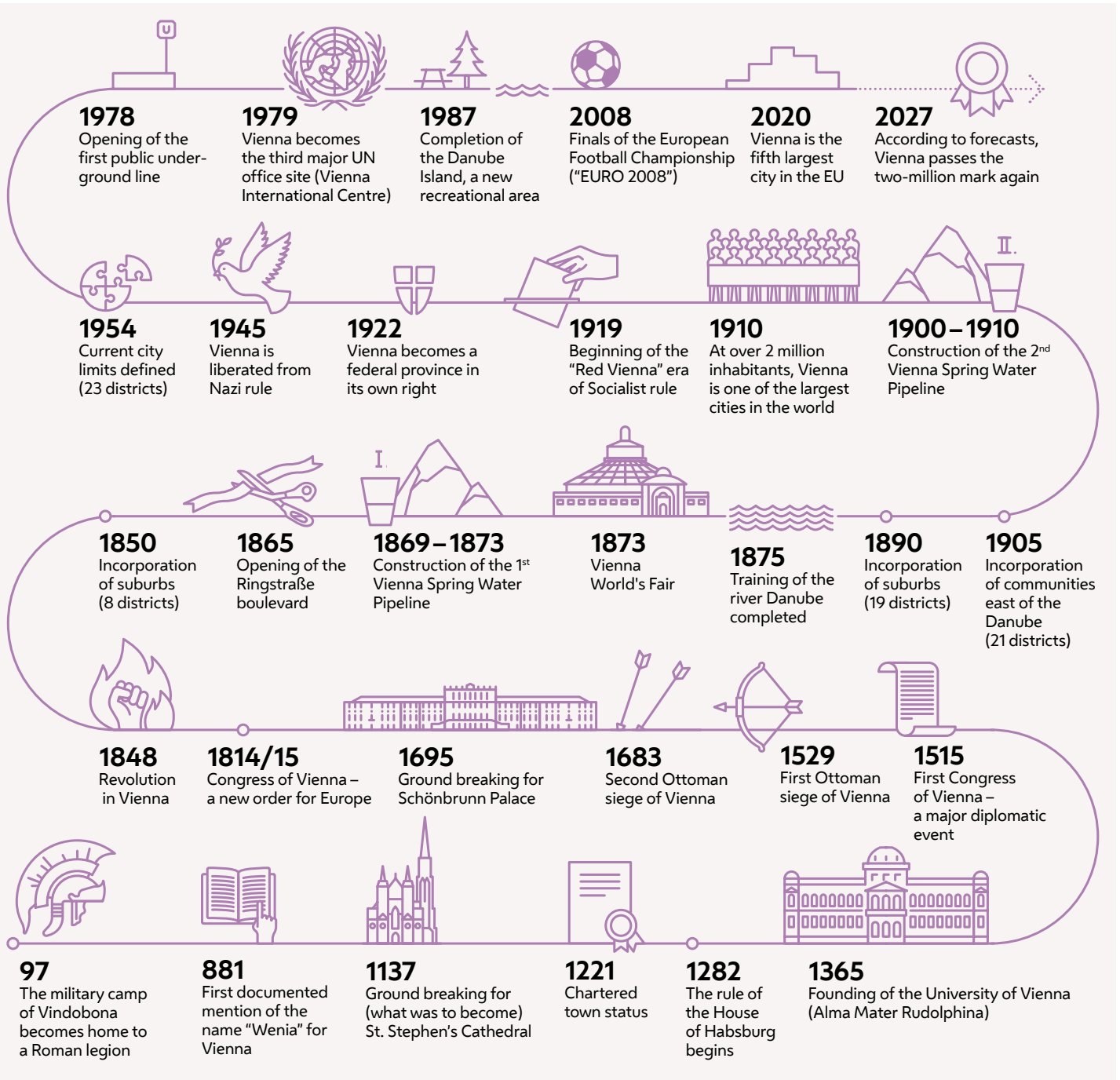

The share of university graduates has been rising significantly over the past 20 years – especially among women.

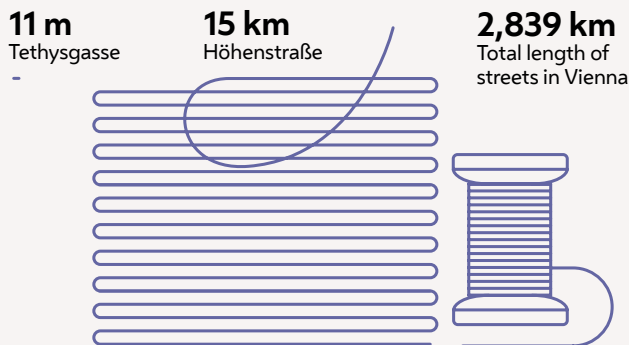

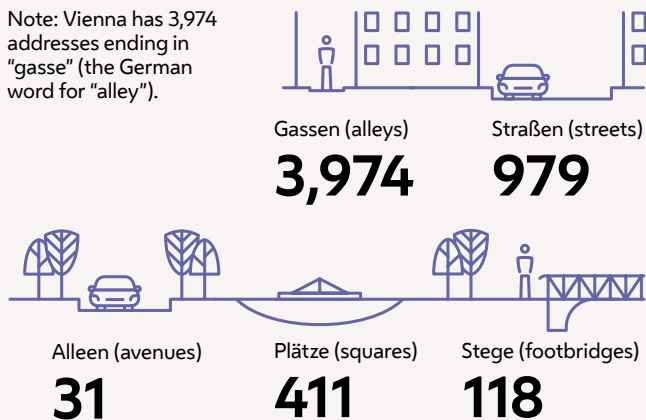
Vienna's shortest and longest streets 2021

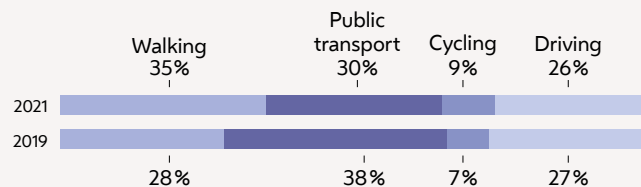

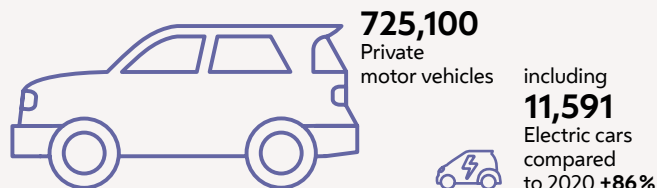

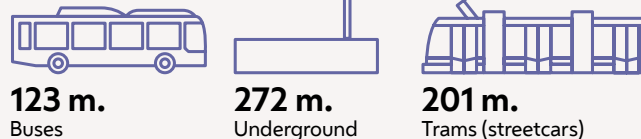

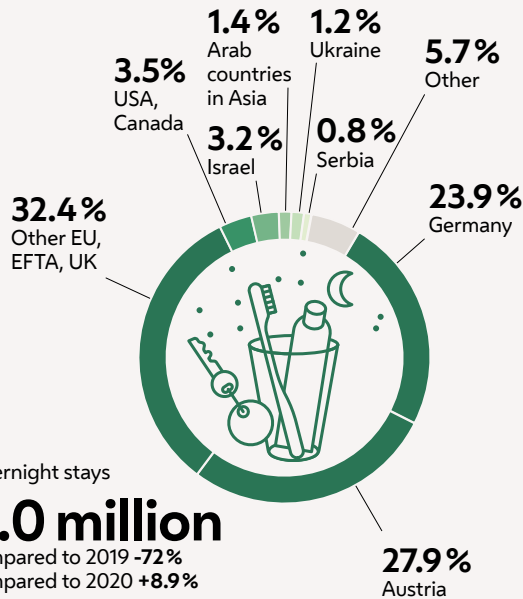

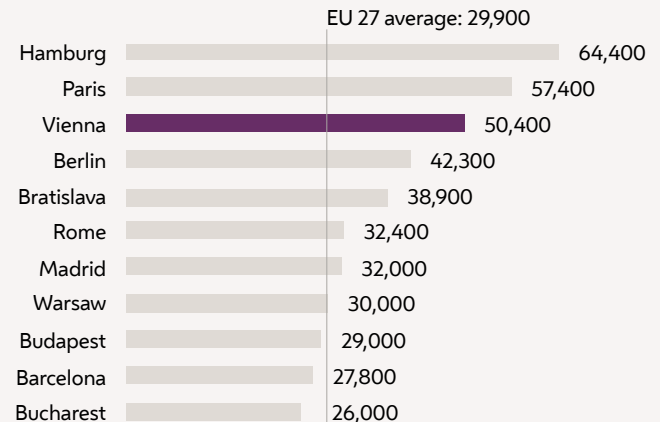

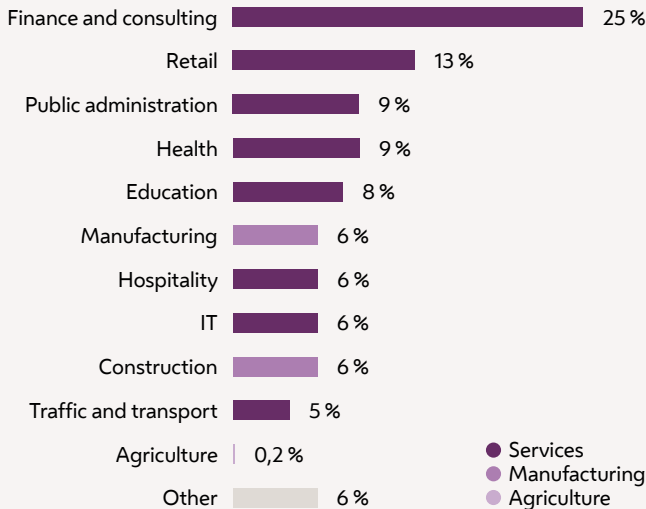

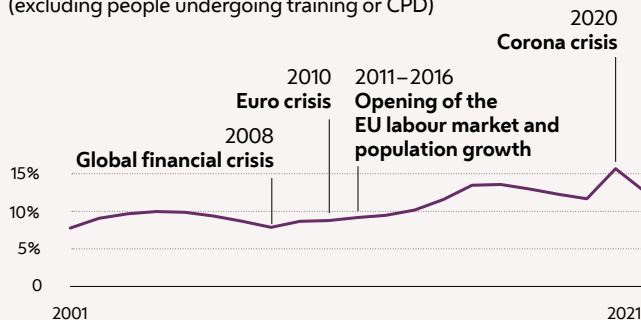

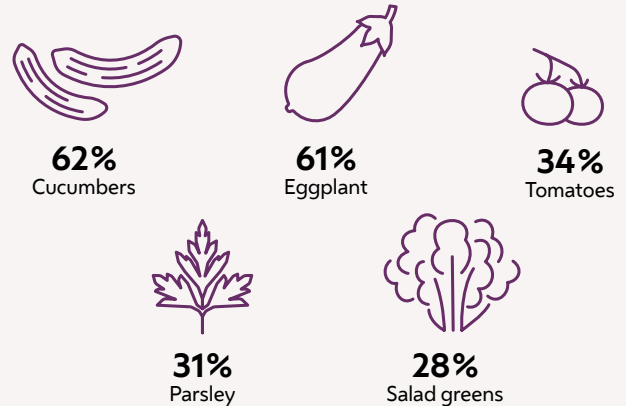

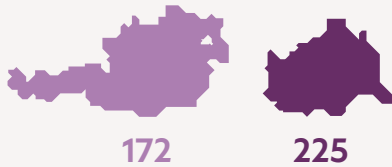

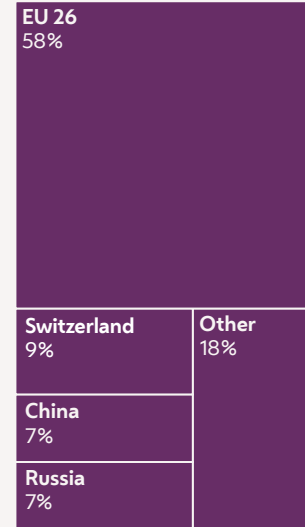

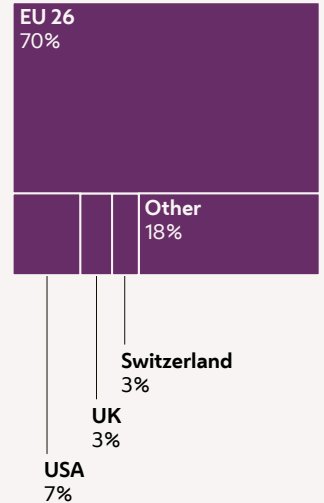

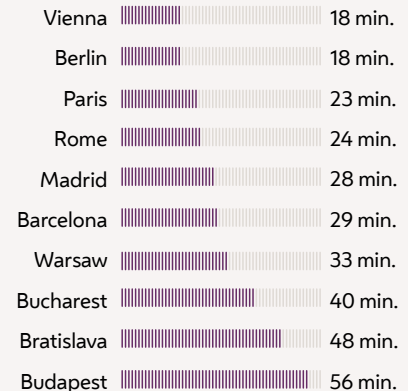

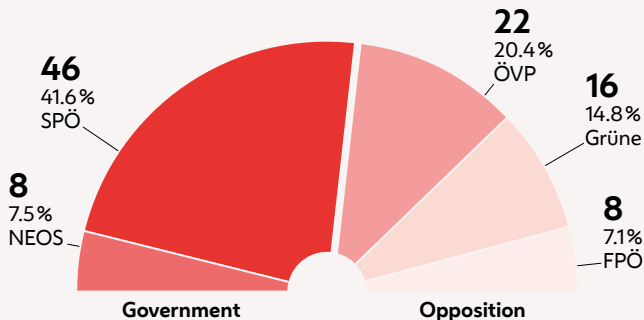

Current **distribution of seats** and result of the elections to the Vienna City Council and the Provincial Parliament 2020



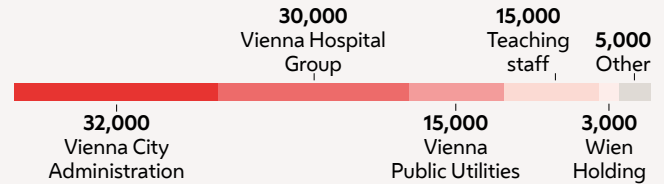
